What is a catastrophic injury?

In [personal injury](#) cases, "catastrophic injury" is commonly used to describe severe injuries that result in long-term or permanent disability. These injuries typically:

- Require extensive medical treatment
- Lead to a significant loss of function (physical or cognitive)
- Prevent the victim from returning to work
- Impact the ability to perform daily tasks independently

What are common types of catastrophic injuries?

Catastrophic injuries are life changing. These are not minor sprains or temporary setbacks. They are the types of injuries that permanently affect a person's ability to work, care for themselves, or enjoy life as they once did. In Texas personal injury cases, catastrophic injuries often serve as a legal turning point due to the extensive medical care, long-term rehabilitation, and lasting financial impact involved. These injuries require serious legal and medical attention. Common types of catastrophic injuries include:

How do catastrophic injuries happen?

- **Slip and falls:** Falls from a significant height or falls caused by hazardous property conditions (like wet floors, broken stairs, or uneven surfaces) can cause serious injuries, especially among older adults. While many assume slip and falls result in minor bruises, these accidents can lead to traumatic brain injuries, spinal cord trauma, or broken hips requiring long-term care.
- **Defective products:** Prescription drugs, faulty car parts, household appliances, and children's toys can cause serious injuries when they malfunction or are improperly designed.
- **Medical malpractice:** Errors made by doctors, nurses, or other healthcare professionals can result in catastrophic consequences. Surgical mistakes, misdiagnoses, medication errors, or failure to treat a serious condition in time can cause permanent harm such as brain damage, paralysis, or loss of organ function.
- **Dog bites:** Dog bites can also cause catastrophic injuries, especially to children or elderly individuals. Victims may suffer severe lacerations, infections, nerve damage, or permanent scarring. In Texas, dog owners may be held liable if they knew or should

have known the animal had aggressive tendencies, or if they failed to properly control their pet.

How catastrophic injury claims differ from other personal injury cases

While all personal injury cases aim to recover damages for harm caused by negligence, catastrophic injury claims typically involve higher stakes. Here's how they differ:

- **Greater losses:** This can include long-term loss of income, the cost of home modifications and medical equipment, caregiver burdens, and the emotional toll of losing companionship and support.

In rare cases where the defendant acted with gross negligence, punitive damages may also be awarded.
